English has taken many words from Irish Gaelic. Some of the most common, such as bog, brogue, galore, and glen you probably weren't aware are Irish in origin. Here are a few more:

- Banshee – It means female fairy or woman of the fairies, but today carries negative connotations of a wild and wailing woman
- Hooligan – One who takes part in rowdy behavior and vandalism
- Shenanigans - Devious tricks used especially for underhanded or mischievous purposes.
- Smithereens – Small fragments
